The Season of Christmas – An Overview

At midnight on December 25th we enter into a new liturgical season: Christmas. The world has been observing Christmas (or some deformed notion of it) for some time. Now we, the children of Christ's Church, after embracing the four weeks of anticipation of the Lord's twofold coming – as Just Judge, when He will come in glory at the end of time *and* as Merciful Savior, when He is borne of the Virgin Mary – are more prepared to receive Him. These weeks of quiet, reflective, penitential joy have more suitably prepared us to rejoice in the festive season of Christmas.

As we began the Season of Advent, I included in the bulletin a superb overview of Advent from the website *Fisheaters*. I do the same now with the Season of Christmas. I hope you find it enjoyable and instructive.

+ + + + +

This, not Advent, is the *true* Christmas Season. As most people in secular or protestantized countries are putting away "Christmas-y" things, and as shopping malls stop blaring "Here Comes Santa Claus," *Catholics are just getting started*. The cleaning and baking during penitential Advent pays off now, and the feasting and caroling begin!

The entire Christmas Cycle is a crescendo of Christ's manifesting Himself as God and King – to the shepherds, to the Magi, at His Baptism, to Simeon and the prophetess, Anna (Luke 2). The days from the Feast of the Nativity to the Epiphany are known as "The Twelve Days of Christmas," with Christmas itself being the first day, and Twelfthnight – 5 January – being the last of the twelve days. Christmastide *liturgically* ends on 13 January, the Octave of the Epiphany and the Baptism of Christ (at which time the season of Time After Epiphany begins). But Christmas doesn't end *spiritually* – i.e., the celebration of the events of Christ's life as a child don't end, and the great Christmas Cycle doesn't end – until Candlemas on 2 February and the beginning of the Season of Septuagesima.

In this way, just as from Ash Wednesday on, we commemorate Christ in the desert for forty days, and just as after Easter we celebrate for forty days until the Ascension, after Christmas we celebrate the Child Jesus for forty days – all through the season of Time After Epiphany – until Candlemas.

The schema of those Christ Child celebrations looks like this:

Christmas

(Dec. 25th) . . . Christ is born.

Feast of the Holy Innocents

(Dec. 28th) . . . Herod slaughters the baby boys in order to kill the Christ Child.

Mary, Mother of God [in EF: Circumcision of Jesus]

(Jan. 1st) . . . Mary is celebrated as the Mother of God and Our Lord submits Himself to the Mosaic Law.

Feast of the Holy Name of Jesus

(Jan. 3rd) . . . After He is circumcised, Jesus is named and becomes a part of the Holy Family.

Twelfth Night

(Jan. 5th) . . . the Twelve Days of Christmas as a Feast come to an end

Feast of the Epiphany

(Jan. 6th) . . . Jesus reveals His divinity to the three Magi, and during His Baptism, and at the wedding at Cana.

Baptism of Our Lord/Octave of the Epiphany

(Jan. 10th . . . in the OF) . . . Christmas *liturgically* ends with the Octave of the Epiphany (or the Baptism of the Lord).

Feast of the Holy Family

[Observed Dec. 27th this year in the OF] . . . Jesus condescends to be subject to His parents.

Feast of the Purification [Candlemas]

(Feb. 2nd) . . . 40 days after giving birth, Mary goes to the Temple to be purified and to "redeem" Jesus per the Old Testament Law of the firstborn. Christmas *truly* ends as a Season with Candlemas and the beginning of Septuagesima.

As we prepare to enter the Season of Christmas this Friday, I do hope you are not already fatigued of Christmas on account of having already immersed yourself in it. Even if you are, there are still a few days of Advent left. Make them a time of quiet prayer. Prepare for the Lord seriously during the final week of Advent. Reflect on the impending birth of Our Divine Savior. If you are off of work or school, come to holy Mass every day. This will certainly prepare you. And then once Christmas arrives, observe the Season to its fullest, as the Church has in mind. The Church gives us over two full weeks to observe Christmas liturgically (that is, Christmas Masses) and over a month to observe it spiritually. What a shame it would be for us to kick the Christ Child to the curb on the very day of His birth.

Eating Meat on Christmas Day and January 1st

As our awareness of the necessity of doing penance on Fridays increases, someone asked me whether it was permissible to eat meat on Christmas day this year. (Remember, December 25th falls on a *Friday* this year.) The answer is Yes, eating meat is permissible. While every Friday of the entire year is a day of penance, when a Solemnity (for example, Christmas – Dec. 25th or Mary, Mother of God – Jan. 1st) falls on a Friday, that particular Friday is no longer observed as a day of penance. So, I say to one and to all: eat meat on the following two Fridays. Eat meat at each and every meal, and enjoy it. I certainly plan on doing that!
